The Justice Department issued new guidelines Thursday on preventing school police from sexually abusing students, a first-ofits-kind effort to create safeguards around officers with immense access to children.

The directives urge law enforcement agencies to train school police on appropriate boundaries with children, ensure there are "multiple ways" for students to report troubling behavior and fully investigate complaints of sexual assault and misconduct by officers.

In unveiling the new standards for the nation's roughly 20,000 school police officers, the Justice Department called on officials to set up robust policies for "preventing officer-perpetrated sexual assault and holding officers who commit these offenses accountable."

The movie calls out stigmas against female sexuality and stereotypes about single mothers. It namedrops feminist scholars, features a woman recalling domestic violence and laments Chinese censorship.

This is not some indie film, streamed secretly by viewers circumventing China's internet firewall. It is China's biggest movie right now — and has even garnered praise from the ruling Communist Party's mouthpiece.

The success of "Her Story," a comedy that topped China's box office for the last three weeks, is in some ways unexpected, at a time when the government has cracked down on feminist activism, encouraged women to embrace marriage and childbearing and severely limited independent speech.

The film's reception reflects the unpredictable nature of censorship in the country, as well as the growing appetite for female-centered stories. Discussion of women's issues is generally allowed, so long as it does not morph into calls for rights. "Her Story," which some have called China's answer to "Barbie," cushions many of its social critiques with jokes.

The streets of Damascus have been filled with celebrations since Bashar al-Assad fled to Russia last Sunday in the face of an unexpected rebel offensive, ending more than 50 years of his family's brutal rule over Syria. But at a public funeral for Mazen al-Hamadah – before his disappearance in 2020 one of the most vocal survivors of torture in the regime's prisons system – the joy gave way to sorrow, as the country begins to grapple with the fact that many of the estimated 130,000 people missing may be lost forever.

Thousands of people flooded the streets on Thursday, following Hamadah's body, wrapped in a traditional white shroud, as it was driven slowly from a hospital to the Abdulrahman Abu al Ouf mosque for funeral prayers.

Mark Zuckerberg handed \$1m (£790,000) to Donald Trump's inauguration fund, just months after the president-elect threatened to imprison him for life.

The billionaire Facebook founder made the donation ahead of a private dinner with Mr Trump at his Mar-alago club last month in a sign of thawing relations between the pair.

Facebook suspended Mr Trump's account for two years in 2021 in the wake of the Jan 6 riots on Capitol Hill. Mr Trump has repeatedly suggested he could jail the Meta chief executive if his social media empire swung the outcome of the election.

The unexpected resignation of Carlos Tavares as chief executive of Stellantis shocked the carmaking industry. The owner of the Chrysler and Fiat vehicle manufacturers has experienced a sharp drop in sales and profit, but Mr Tavares was expected to stay on until the end of his contract in 2026. No reason was given for his departure with immediate effect, but reports suggested tensions had arisen in the company over the cost-cutting strategy being driven by Mr Tavares.

Underlining the malaise in the car industry, General Motors said in a regulatory filing that it would book \$5bn in charges reflecting the restructuring and reduced value of its joint ventures in China. GM's market share in the country has declined sharply in recent years.

The Trump transition team has started to explore pathways to dramatically shrink, consolidate or even eliminate the top bank watchdogs in Washington.

In interviews with potential nominees to lead bank regulatory agencies, Trump advisers and officials from his newfound Department of Government Efficiency have, for example, asked whether the presidentelect could abolish the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp., people familiar with the matter said.

Advisers have asked the nominees under consideration for the FDIC, as well as the Office of the Comptroller of the Currency, if deposit insurance could then be absorbed into the Treasury Department, some of the people said.

As The Middle Est Prepares For The Return of Donald Trump to the White House, Saudi Arabia is looking to strike a deal with Washington reflective of its ascending geopolitical status and the vast changes in the region over the past four years. Trump's election win in November came as Washington and Riyadh remained locked in negotiations toward a grand deal that would include U.S. security assurances for Saudi Arabia and closer cooperation in various fields, such as nuclear development. At the same time, President Joe Biden's administration has also sought to establish diplomatic ties between Israel and Saudi Arabia in the vein of the Abraham Accords—a series of agreements that Trump oversaw with four Arab nations in 2020.

He was at one point apparently so close to the prince that he was invited to his 60th birthday party in 2020.

President-elect Donald Trump on Sunday resurrected his first-term infatuation with obtaining Greenland for the United States.

Buying Greenland from Denmark became a preoccupation for Trump during his first stint in the White House, an idea he first discussed privately and later publicly confirmed.

Greenland is not the only territory Trump has eyed for US expansion since winning reelection. Trump has somewhat playfully (but also repeatedly) taunted Canadian Prime Minister Justin Trudeau with the suggestion that the US could absorb Canada as its 51st state.

With human activity driving what conservation charity the World Wide Fund for Nature (WWF) calls a "catastrophic" loss of species, it can sometimes feel like we don't hear an awful lot of good news about nature.

But a ten-year study showed conservation actions are effective at reducing global biodiversity loss. Scientists from dozens of research institutes reviewed 665 trials of conservation measures in different countries and oceans, and found they had had a positive effect in two out of every three cases.

The measures ranged from hatching Chinook salmon to the eradication of invasive algae, and the study's authors said their findings offered a "ray of light" for those working to protect threatened animals and plants.
